My academic interests are centered around postcolonial studies, African American literature, and Folklore. I am fascinated by how stories and language can reorient people, and growing up in Baghdad, along with my exposure to American and Hawaiian cultures, has given me a unique perspective on how history, culture, and worldviews are conveyed through literature.

Throughout my academic career, I have taught a diverse range of courses, including Reading Skills, Writing Skills, Academic Writing, TOEFL, Renaissance Poetry, Introduction to Literature, EFL for Graduate School, EFL for Undergraduate School, Introduction to English Literature, Introduction to English Poetry, and Human Rights.

In all of the courses I teach, I strongly emphasize critical thinking skills, literary analysis, and genre analysis. For instance, in my Human Rights course, I design assignments that challenge students and promote their understanding of the complex issues in Human Rights in Iraq. Additionally, I organized and delivered a workshop on human rights for professors and instructors in the College of Education.

Moreover, I have taught TOEFL preparation courses focused on enhancing students' academic writing and reading, speaking and listening skills, and academic vocabulary. Lastly, I have taught a Research Methodology Course where I effectively lectured, guided, monitored, and evaluated students, further strengthening my teaching skills.
